

MAKING THE MATCH

Hot off the heels of a successful first phase, The Campaign for Opportunity Scholarships begins 2-to-1 matching for establishing new endowed scholarships.

Graduating from the MiraCosta College Nursing Program may not have been possible for Kendra Koenig without the combination of hard work, perseverance and financial assistance in the form of scholarships.

Born and raised in North County San Diego, Koenig's aspiration to become a nurse began at the tender age of 12. "I knew I wanted to become a nurse when my stepdad passed away from a massive heart attack," Koenig said. "Ever since, I have been interested in emergency medicine and cardiology."

During her senior year of high school, Koenig began her search for nursing schools and found MiraCosta College's brand-new Registered Nursing (RN) Program, which was established to meet the region's need for highly skilled health care workers. "MiraCosta's program was always my first choice," she said.

It took a couple of years to finish her prerequisites, but she said it was definitely worth the wait. "The nursing program was absolutely amazing. The instructors are all knowledgeable, well-prepared, hands-on and really want you to succeed in the field."

#### THE IMPORTANCE OF SCHOLARSHIPS

During the intense program, Koenig worked full time as an EMT at Tri-City Medical Center. She found the combination of school and work challenging and decided to apply for a scholarship.

"Any extra money does help and I am so happy there are many scholarships available out there, especially for nurses," said Koenig, who received the prestigious Tri-City Hospital Auxiliary scholarship. Over the years, the auxiliary, an

amazing and generous partner with the college, has provided more than \$124,000 in scholarships for MiraCosta College nursing students.

In December 2012, Koenig finished the nursing program and today holds two jobs: one at Tri-City Medical Center as a registered nurse and another as a per-diem hospice nurse in Carlsbad.

"I find my field really rewarding and I am so thankful to MiraCosta College for helping me achieve my dreams. One day, after I receive my master's degree in nursing, I would love to come back to MiraCosta and be a nursing instructor because I believe education is key, especially in medicine."

#### THE CAMPAIGN FOR **OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIPS:** MATCHING FUNDS AVAILABLE

Because of students like Koenig, MiraCosta College, together with its foundation, launched and completed phase one of the Campaign for Opportunity Scholarships this past academic year. Generous donors made gifts totaling \$500,000, which will be used as matching funds to expand scholarship endowments by \$1.5 million.

The campaign is now in phase two and ready to match new gifts for endowed scholarships on a 2-to-1 basis. For example, a gift of \$16,500 will be matched by the foundation with \$8,500—enabling the donor to establish a full \$25,000 endowed scholarship.\*

"This campaign is urgent for us now because every year the number of students who have found their way to MiraCosta, worked hard to earn the respect of their professors, and asked for help in the form of scholarships far exceeds available funding," said Dr. Dick Robertson, MiraCosta's interim superintendent/president.

How will \$1.5 million in new scholarship endowments benefit students? In the first year alone, the new endowments will generate 60, \$1,000 scholarships—helping 60 students achieve their educational goals.

MiraCosta College Foundation board member, Navy veteran and theatre patron, Hap L'Heureux and his sister, Connie Boose, have already taken advantage of the match and both donated a total of \$50,000. Their generous donations will provide two new scholarships: one for the MiraCosta Theatre & Film Department and the other for student veterans.

"I wanted to provide scholarships for full-time theatre students because I wanted to let them know there are people out there who truly appreciate their craft and to give them encouragement to keep pursuing it," L'Heureux said. "Likewise, the scholarship for veterans, I wanted to help them however we can with the challenges they face after serving our country."

#### WHY ENDOWMENTS ARE **IMPORTANT**

Endowments are gifts that just keep on giving. Over 50 years, based on conservative estimates, the funds will have paid out more than \$3 million in scholarships to 3,000 students and the principal of the endowed funds will be valued at about \$3.8 million.

"MiraCosta College is an 80-year-old institution and we fully anticipate that this college will be here for another 80 or even 160 years," said Linda Fogerson, executive director of the foundation. "By establishing this scholarship endowment, we are ensuring a reliable stream of funding for scholarships... forever." ■

#### WHAT IS AN ENDOWMENT?

An endowment is a permanent fund bestowed upon the college to be used for a specific purpose, such as scholarships. The fund is invested for intergenerational growth and the interest earned on the investment is used to fund the charitable purpose specified by the donor. Additional earnings are then reinvested back into the fund, which helps the fund continue to grow. This ensures that the fund will have the same buying power in 100 years as the date it was established.



#### **MULTI-YEAR PLEDGES**

We accept multi-year pledges for this campaign. This makes it easier to plan your charitable giving from year to year. At the end of your pledge period, you will have a full \$25,000 scholarship!

# MATCHING FUNDS AVAILABLE

#### IT'S EASY TO PARTICIPATE!

- S All gifts for new endowed scholarships to support students with financial need will be matched on a 2-to-1 basis. In other words, for every two dollars donated, the foundation will match that gift with one dollar.
- Solution You can make a gift of any amount to our general endowed Opportunity Scholarships Fund and that gift will be matched on a 2-to-1 basis.
- S Consider establishing a scholarship with matching funds specifically designated for nursing or horticulture.
- You can also set up a named, endowed scholarship, for example:
  - One-semester scholarship \$10,000 + \$5,000 = \$15,000 (donation) (match)
  - Full scholarship
     \$16,500 + \$8,500 = \$25,000
     (donation) (match)

# Next stop, MIT

While an outstanding academic record was enough to gain high school senior Richard Huizar acceptance to his preferred local university, that other critical piece—the financial wherewithal—was missing.

Instead of giving up or going into significant debt, this San Marcos resident turned to MiraCosta College, a more affordable yet academically outstanding option that would prepare him for a seat at one of our nation's most prestigious universities.

In May 2014, after two years of studying applied mathematics at MiraCosta College, Huizar graduated as an Honors Scholar with a 3.9 GPA, and is now a student at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), where he is working toward a bachelor's and ultimately a doctorate degree. "MiraCosta College was my educational destiny," said Huizar.

While studying at MiraCosta College, Huizar held down three campus jobs, was president of the soccer club, served as a student ambassador, was on the President's List, and scored a perfect 800 on the SAT subject tests in math and physics. His accomplishments did not go unnoticed—he was also




# MIRACOSTA COLLEGE 2013-14 FINANCIAL REPORT



### MiraCosta College Resource Management






### MiraCosta College Expenses\* Fiscal Year 2013-2014


#### **Foundation Revenues\***

Fiscal Year 2013-2014




#### Foundation Allocations/Expenses\*

## Belynn Gonzales is helping MiraCosta College students achieve their educational goals.

Belynn Gonzales, a 1977 MiraCosta College alumna, experienced firsthand the hardships many community college students face and has triumphed. Now a successful restaurateur and community leader, she is helping others succeed.

Gonzales was raised by her grandparents, entrepreneurs who opened a barber shop and a restaurant, Garcia's, in downtown Carlsbad. Although they owned two businesses, money was scarce. At the age of 7, Gonzales started working at Garcia's to help her family make ends meet.

As a student at MiraCosta College, Gonzales continued to work full time to afford the cost of school and at age 23, after earning her bachelor's degree, she became the owner of her family's restaurant. Today, Garcia's two locations are thriving after 36 years of Gonzales' management, enabling her to be active in the community, serving as a member of the Chambers of Commerce in Carlsbad and Encinitas and the Rotary Club of Carlsbad.

Now Gonzales is giving back to her alma mater. She is establishing a scholarship fund and developing her estate plan so she can help others as they reach for higher education. She knows the struggle students face, which is why she is giving back.

"Giving is important to me, because I know I needed help," she said. "I want to see someone benefit from the tremendous support a scholarship can provide."
